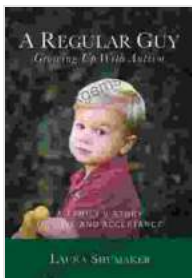


A Regular Guy Growing Up with Autism: My Personal Journey

- **Never give up on your dreams.** Anything is possible if you set your mind to it.

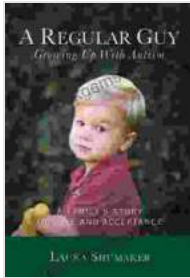
I hope my story can inspire others who are growing up with autism. Know that you are not alone. There are people who care about you and want to help you succeed.

Embrace your autism. It is part of what makes you unique and special.

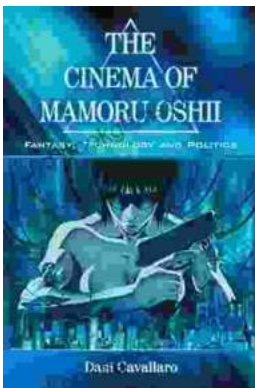
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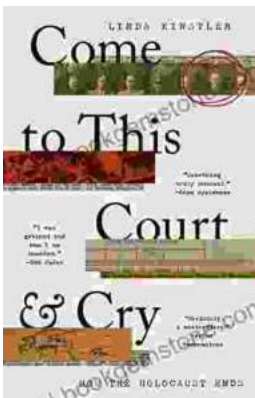


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
