
 Dress Code: Iran has a conservative dress code. Women are expected to wear a headscarf (hijab) in public. Men should wear modest clothing that covers their knees.

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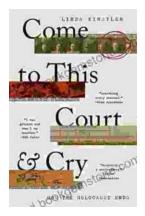
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
